Humanity must enter into a completely new understanding of the reality in which we exist. The

Joseph R. Simonetta earned a BS in Business Logistics from Penn State University, and then achieved an MS of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School where he studied ethics, global environmental problems, world religions, cosmology, and evolutionary biology. He also studied at Yale Divinity School. He also holds an MS in Architecture from the University of Colorado.

Born in Bethlehem, PA, to an immigrant blue-collar steelworker and his wife, he was raised in the shadows of the blast furnaces of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation.

He has since lived for significant amounts of time in California, Colorado, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Florida, Greece, New Zealand, and Ecuador.

He has been an Army officer, professional athlete, entrepreneur and businessman, architectural designer, real estate developer, home builder, environmental activist, author, speaker, senior editor of the World Business Academy, twice a nominee for the U.S. Congress, and once a nominee for the U.S. presidency (Democratic Party National Convention, New York City, 1992).

Intermittently, he wrote a mix of fiction and nonfiction books about humanity and the state of the world. He serves on the board of directors of The Secular Community.

At the 2023 U.S. National Senior Games held in Pittsburgh, PA in July 2023, he won the gold medal in the Sprint Triathlon in his age division, 80-84. For stories about this, Google "Joe Simonetta triathlon."

As a young man, disturbed at the extraordinary amount of unrelenting suffering in the world, he vowed to himself to do something to alleviate it.

RECAP OF OUR OCTOBER SPEAKER'S TALK

Abhijit Chanda is the founder of "Rationable," a YouTube channel. (The name does not refer to things subject to rationing, but rather rationality.) He joined us from India, speaking about "Alternative Health Practices and Pseudoscience."

A starting point was to query reasons for the popularity of "alternative" medicine as opposed to the conventional (real) sort. Chanda characterized the latter, in America, as not exactly user-friendly. People recoil from giant institutions like government, insurance companies, and big pharma. Mainstream doctors often seem cold and brusque, in contrast to "alternative" practitioners exuding warmth. Many people take modern medicine for granted, while venerating "traditional" treatments as better fitted to their beliefs, philosophies, and psychologies. As opposed to critical thinking.

But he suggested that critical thinking doesn't necessarily correlate with intelligence. In that regard, he cited Steve Jobs, certainly a very intelligent guy, who insisted on treating his cancer outside of mainstream medicine. This didn't work out well.

There's also the appeal of the word "natural," with the idea that it equates to "good." Wow, is that wrong: Chanda called it the "naturalistic fallacy." Humanity's whole history is a battle against nature; it can kill you. That's not to say we don't get some useful treatments from nature, like penicillin. But it requires science to separate what's good from what's bad.

Proponents of "alternative" treatments often do make scientific claims. But Chanda was pretty dismissive of that. It's typically window-dressing rather than real science, producing the conclusions the "researcher" wants to get. He cited the example of a Covid cure touted as 100% effective in trials. Well, to start with, 97% of people don't get Covid in the first place. (The purveyor eventually backed off the claim, instead saying his snake oil "boosts immunity", whatever that might actually mean.)

Yet numerous people insist that even stuff like homeopathy — which is literally no treatment at all — helps them. Of course that's the placebo effect, which is quite powerful. It throws a monkey wrench into any attempt at rational discussion.

Another word often thrown around is "energy." (Chanda displayed a website piling on the feel-good lingo, hawking "Holistic Calming Energy.") He said these folks actually don't know what they're talking about when it comes to "energy" (which is actually not some Jedilike force, but prosaically defined as "the ability to do work"). Related here is the notion of a "life force" that somehow emanates within us ("vitalism"). That just ain't how things work.

Chanda focused particularly on "Ayurveda" practice, originating in India. The word loosely translates as "knowledge of life." Another of his targets was Reiki, which he said is not, contrary to common belief, some "ancient wisdom," but invented in the 1920s by one Mikao Usui, who died at 60, not exactly a great advertisement for Reiki's health benefits.

The basic problem with all this stuff is that it's grounded in ignorance of the true causes of disease and illness. Ayurveda is ancient — long predating germ theory! And typically it relies on the archaic concept that illness is caused by some sort of imbalance among bodily "humours." It was that kind of thinking that, for centuries, made bloodletting an all-purpose treatment for any malady (it killed George Washington). We now know it's complete bunk.

Chanda's final takeaway: Just let science do its thing. (What world is he living in?)






October 14, 2023 Social at Empire State Aerosciences Museum

Preacher Who Lied About Military Service Plans to Open "Christian Military Academy"

Mark Burns, a résumé-padding, culture war-obsessed MAGA cultist and pastor who failed in his 2022 bid for Congress, says he's going to open a Christian military academy.

During a conspiracy-driven ReAwaken America event last weekend, Burns praised his Lord and Savior Donald Trump—"We don't care about those indictments! We don't care about those arrests!"—before making a little announcement of his own: The "Burns Christian Military Academy" will open next year in order "to save our children from the evil public school system."

The announcement lacked details, but Right Wing Watch points out that he elaborated on Facebook earlier this month:

Quote from Burns: "... Our mission is to provide an affordable, pro-American education with a strong emphasis on biblical teachings, and to create an environment where children can learn and grow without the need for discipline or court-ordered attendance. This school is not designed for children who have discipline issues. Our goal is to keep our rates extremely low at \$200 per month per student.

"Our school aims to instill good morals and a love for our country in our students while ensuring that they are not exposed to LGBTQ, CRT, or 'woke' teachings. We believe that our children are more than capable of making their own decisions and that they deserve a safe and nurturing environment to thrive in.

"We plan to have our students wear a military-inspired uniform, akin to those worn by cadets at WestPoint and VMI. We also encourage parents, grandparents, and mentors to participate by wearing the uniform, fostering a sense of community and support.

"Our curriculum will be based on the popular Abeka Curriculum, preparing our students for college, technical school, or business ownership. We are committed to providing a safe and bullying-free environment, and will notify parents immediately if any child reports being bullied."

To be clear, there's no actual connection to the U.S. military. The word just sounds important. Same with "Academy." But this is nothing more than a private Christian school with costumes. Abeka, for those who aren't familiar with it, is a popular home-schooling curriculum for parents who don't want their kids to actually learn anything. And not exposing kids to the existence of LGBTQ people, ignoring the role of African Americans throughout our history (which is what conservatives mean when they denounce "CRT"), and dismissing challenging ideas under the guise of wokeness is basically an announcement that kids won't learn the kind of material they may need to function outside their Christian bubble.

This isn't a military academy. This is just another form of Christian Nationalist indoctrination. And it's from a guy who said just last year that teachers who accept and educate students about LGBTQ people should be charged with treason, then executed.

It's familiar rhetoric for anyone who's followed Burns and his political trajectory over the years. In November of 2021, he called for the establishment of a theocracy, saying that anything "contrary to the word of God" needs to be removed from the country and made "illegal." This is a man who offered up a biblical defense when Trump condemned African nations as "s**thole countries."

Burns is a professional liar who wants to put his hand on the Bible while torching the Constitution.

And conservative Christians just embrace it. Even if Burns lost the GOP primary last year, he still gets invited on right-wing talk shows and still serves as a hype man at MAGA-friendly events.

If there's any consolation here, it's that Burns has a long history of lying. So for all we know, this school will never actually launch. At some point, he'll probably ask for funding. Then he'll say the school is unable to launch. Then he'll blame liberals, somehow. Then he'll pretend like this never happened.

For a preacher who falsely claimed he spent six years in the Army Reserve, this is just the latest example of Burns disrespecting the people who actually serve in uniform. (via **Right Wing Watch**)
