How do people become entangled in conspiracy theories and other shared delusions? This question has long been the province of novelists, but recently psychologists and social scientists have applied the tools of their disciplines to shed light on this vexing question.

This talk will survey their findings so far about the psychological and social factors that lead people to embrace dogmatic delusions, and to double down on them in the face of contrary evidence. We will discuss the personality characteristics and life history that incline people to rigid beliefs. We'll consider the everyday personal delusions that most of us hold. We'll discuss the social process of converting and committing to a shared delusion. Finally we'll briefly consider the psychology of reasoning and what conditions make people more amenable to changing their minds.

Dr. Mark Reimers is a quantitative neuroscientist, researching how dynamic brain activity gives rise to thoughts and feelings. Dr. Reimers has worked at the US National Institutes of Health, the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, the Virginia Institute for Psychiatric and Behavioral Genetics and at Michigan State University. His broader aim is to ground our understanding of feeling and thought in brain dynamics and biology.

Dr. Reimers was the leader of the Richmond Humanists in Virginia for five years, and the leader of the UU Forum in Lansing, MI for six years; he speaks frequently at humanist and science outreach events in Michigan and online. He is trying to weave together brain science with humanist aspirations.

Historian Yuval Noah Harari is a Big Thinker. His 2024 blockbuster book, *Nexus: A Brief History of Information Networks From the Stone Age to AI*, concerns how Artificial Intelligence will shape our future. An AI "app" is a computer program trained on a vast amount of information (from the internet), learning to see patterns, for use in carrying out tasks. This is not thinking as we humans think of thinking; that's probably a long way off. Nevertheless, AI has huge impacts on many aspects of our lives, which Harari's book magisterially explores. A key problem is AI acting as an "alien" intelligence — working along lines we may not even understand. The book also importantly explores its implications for the future of democratic versus totalitarian systems.

RECAP OF OUR JANUARY SPEAKER'S TALK

Dr. Yotam Ophir is an Associate Professor of Communications at the State University, Buffalo. His talk was titled, "Misinformation, Conspiracy Theories, and Extremism in an Age of Political Mega-Identities." Based on his studying thousands of years of misinformation, and his forthcoming book, Misinformation and Society, it's a pretty bleak assessment.

He started off discussing the epidemic, noting inequality of impacts, surprise, horror, anxiety, distrust of experts and officials, widespread conspiracy theories, quack solutions, scapegoating, and violence. Of course he was not talking about Covid, but the 1854 cholera outbreak. With Covid, in contrast to earlier times when diseases' causes were not understood, information was widely available and spread fast. Yet in America, it was politicized like no disease before.

Giving Ophir his Lesson #1 - Nothing is new, but nothing is the same.

We're living in what's been called the "Post-Truth" era, blamed on Trump and social media. Yet before that we did have JFK assassination conspiracy theories, the 1980s-'90s "Satanic Panic" (resembling QAnon), and even further back, literal witch hunts. Today's "Great Replacement Theory" also had antecedents. But what differs now is ubiquity of tools to create visual misinformation, and our intimate relationship with our devices.

His Lesson #2 was that we did not evolve to be seekers of accurate information. Yet we've had a longtime preoccupation with assessing reality, going back at least to Plato's cave allegory. What evolution did endow us with is pattern recognition. Seeing what might be a tiger in the bushes, running away fast preserved your genes to reproduce, while if you deliberated, you'd be eaten. But such quick judgments often disserve us.

Ophir discussed some examples, displaying a chart showing a seemingly strong correlation between Maine's divorce rate and margarine consumption. But a key point is that correlation does not mean causation, a principle most people don't instinctively apply. And feelings tend to trump facts; if people feel crime is rising [they always do — FSR] facts won't sway them. Meantime, another thing evolution gave us was prioritizing tribal solidarity over facts. We feel it's more important to be in good with our social groups, which was vital for group survival.

His Lesson #3 was that misinformation is growing more political. The group think operates especially strongly here, with many people's principal sense of identity being their politics. And, further, the misinformation problem is asymmetrical — much bigger on the right. Ophir cited Chris Mooney's book, The Republican War on Science, battling the scientific consensus about climate change, even about evolution. We saw this too regarding Covid, with Trump voting areas having higher infection rates (due to science rejectionism). And it's not just science, but misinformation and fake news more generally, which the right is more prone to seek, see, and spread.

The other side is not somehow magically protected. However, on the right, leadership and elites actively working to push falsehoods is a much bigger phenomenon. And they do so with increasing impunity.

So Lesson #4: The price for spreading misinformation is in sharp decline. In fact, it's rewarded, not punished. Marjorie Taylor Greene's political clout keeps growing. And of course Trump goes from triumph to triumph the more he lies. Indeed, Ophir asserted his voters trust him more than their own families! [Says something about the character of those families — FSR.]

Lying, Ophir suggested, is actually a conscious strategy, quoting Trump's sometime consigliere Steve Bannon's "Flood the zone with excrement" (using a more graphic word which wouldn't make it into a CDHS newsletter). And the media can't turn away, because the public eats it up.

In the Q&A there was reference to "the marketplace of ideas." A free marketplace, Ophir amended. Not what we have, when Facebook for example decides what you'll see — based on trying to maximize "engagement" (and thus ad revenue).

Finally, Lesson #5: There's no silver bullet solution. Ophir rounded up the usual obvious remedies, but said they really don't seem to work; can even backfire, making people even more wedded to false beliefs. Instead we need big systemic changes — bolster democratic institutions; curb money in politics; restore the authority of party leaderships; rebuild journalism with perhaps public media; advance media literacy education. [And make pigs fly — FSR.]

But he ended by quoting Leonard Cohen: "There's a crack in everything. That's how the light gets in."

New Year, New Secular Representation in Congress

The American Humanist Association (AHA) and Center for Freethought Equality (CFE) staff met with new and returning Members of Congress on the very first day of the 119th Congress session to begin establishing important relationships and putting a face to the powerful secular constituency. Although Congress continues to be more religious than the country as a whole—CQ Roll Call survey reported that 95 percent of Senate and House members identify with a religious faith, while a Pew Research Center survey found 70 percent of Americans affiliate with a religious faith—there is a growing cohort of nonreligious members.

For Democrats, incoming Arizona Representative Yassamin Ansari identified as "agnostic," incoming Washington Representative Emily Randall identified as "none" (she will also be the first openly queer Latina in Congress), and California Representative Jared Huffman continues to identify as a "humanist." Ohio's Dave Taylor is the one Republican who did not specify a religious affiliation. CQ Roll Call stated that, "another 21 Democrats did not specify a religious affiliation."

Hemant Mehta recognized CFE Political Manager Ron Millar for encouraging Ansari to mark her public identifier as agnostic when they talked at an event hosted by the Congressional Progressive Caucus PAC. "Ansari also won her primary by 39 votes (following a recount). She's a reminder of why voting matters and how those votes can help change the conversation when it comes to diversity and representation at the highest levels of government."

Mehta also wrote in his article, "Secular organizations still matter!" Ron Millar, political and PAC manager of the Center for Freethought Equality expands on that statement, "We are making advances in Congress and in state legislatures because we are doing the work to increase our community's visibility, which makes elected officials and candidates more comfortable to identify with the humanist and freethought community. This turns into a positive feedback loop because as more elected officials publicly identify with us, the lingering bias against our community diminishes, which in turn allows more members of our community to also confidently be public as a humanist, agnostic, atheist, or nonreligious. Our efforts are making it possible for members of our community to be their authentic selves across the country."

The CFE does extensive outreach to candidates and elected officials to indicate that there is a humanist and atheist community to support them, demonstrate that being their authentic selves will not end their careers, and encourage members of our community to run for office. Our elected officials will work against the efforts of White Christian Nationalism to build a future for a safer, saner, stronger, and more secular America. More than a quarter of our country's population identifies as religiously unaffiliated, and are making our values known at the ballot box and running for—and winning—seats in public office.

At his opening day reception, Maryland Rep. Jamie Raskin (co-founder and co-chair of the Congressional Freethought Caucus) quoted a letter by Thomas Jefferson in reference to the current situation in Washington: "A little patience, and we shall see the reign of witches pass over, their spells dissolve, and the people, recovering their true sight, restore their government to its true principles." That same day, Speaker Mike Johnson, the top Christian Nationalist on Capitol Hill, offered "a prayer for the nation" on the House floor that he incorrectly claimed Jefferson had written and said every day. Thankfully, the Thomas Jefferson Foundation recovered the truth and debunked this falsehood.

Now is the time to get involved and make sure our lawmakers protect our country's democratic principles and represent all of us—no matter how they or we identify religiously.
